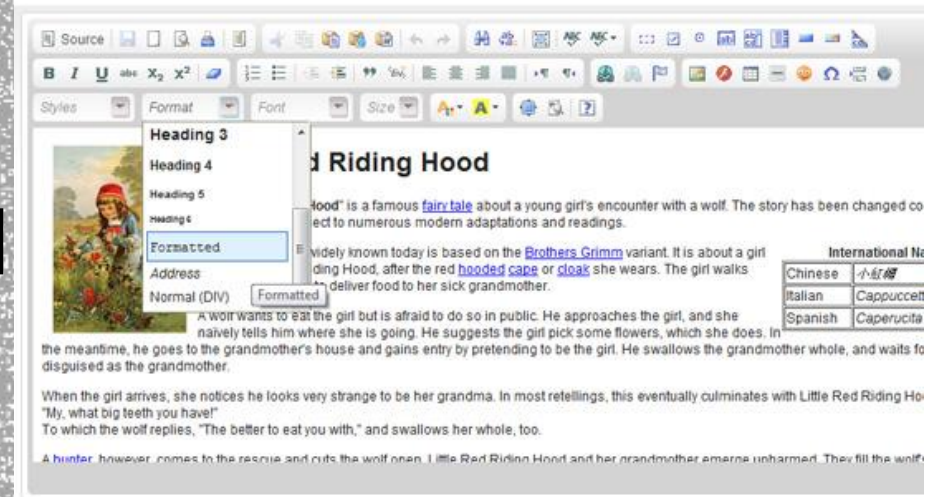


HOW TO CREATE SITE?

Visual tools are all well and good, but sometimes you need to do some old-school coding by hand. Here's our pick of the best text editors.

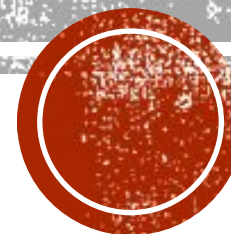
- Text (source) editors intended for use with HTML usually provide syntax highlighting.

Text editors require user understanding of HTML and any other web technologies the designer wishes to use like CSS, JavaScript and server-side scripting languages.

- These editors may be stand-alone programs, such as Adobe Dreamweaver or Microsoft Frontpage (now discontinued), or come in the form of browser extensions and allow editing directly within the web browser. Because using a WYSIWYG editor may not require any HTML knowledge, they are often easier for an inexperienced computer user to get started with.
