






















# London Zoo





Hyde Park has got a lake in the middle. The name of the lake is **the Serpentine**. You can go boating on it.









# The Rotten Row


Some people come to Hyde Park to ride a horse on **the Rotten Row**. It's a place for riding.

Peter stands on a pedestal. He is playing the pipe and little children and small animals are listening to him.














