*St George's Day in England remembers St George, England's patron saint. April 23, his death anniversary, is seen as England's national day.*

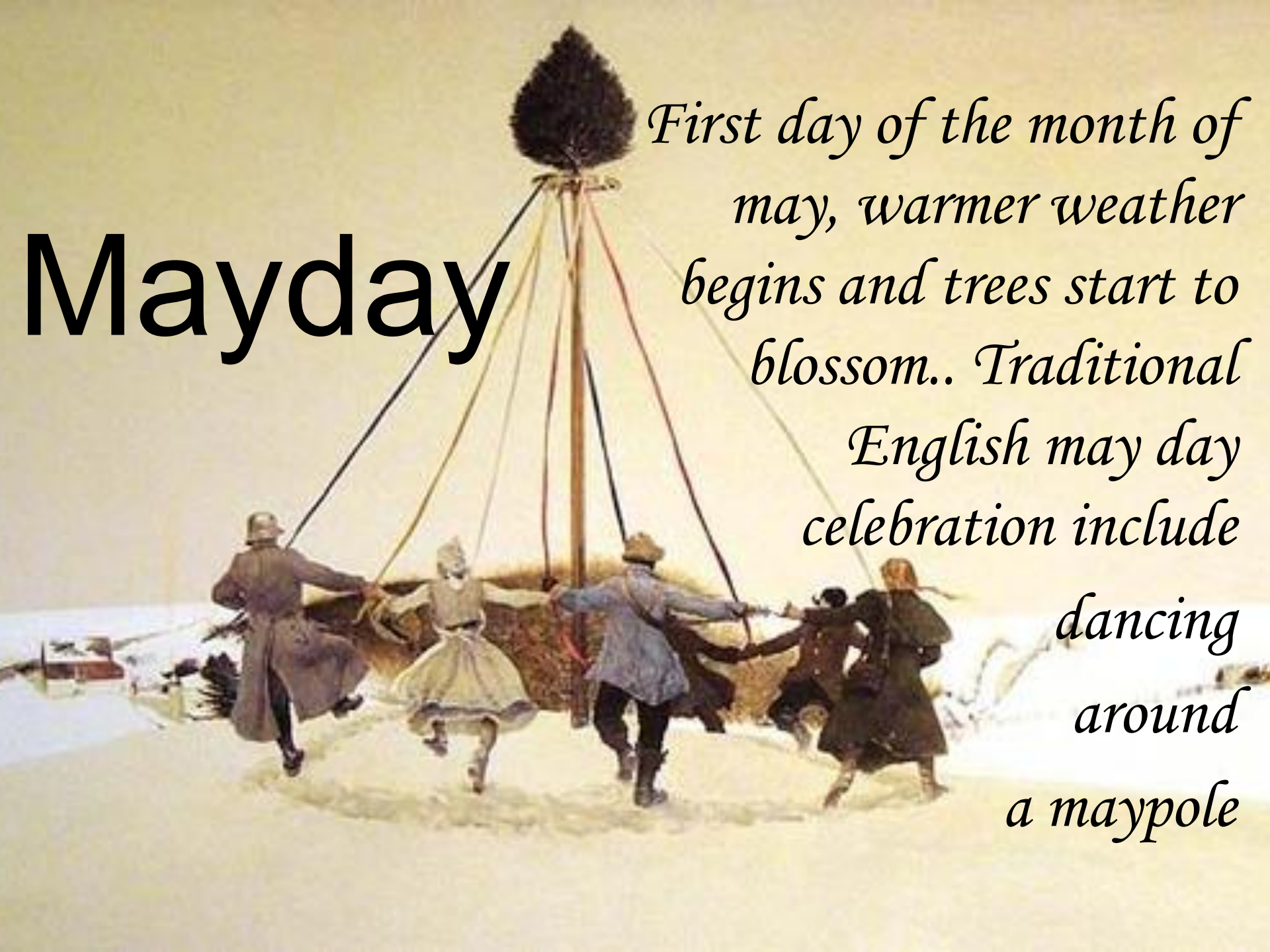
# Easter

*On his or her hundredth birthday, a British person gets a telegram from the Queen.*



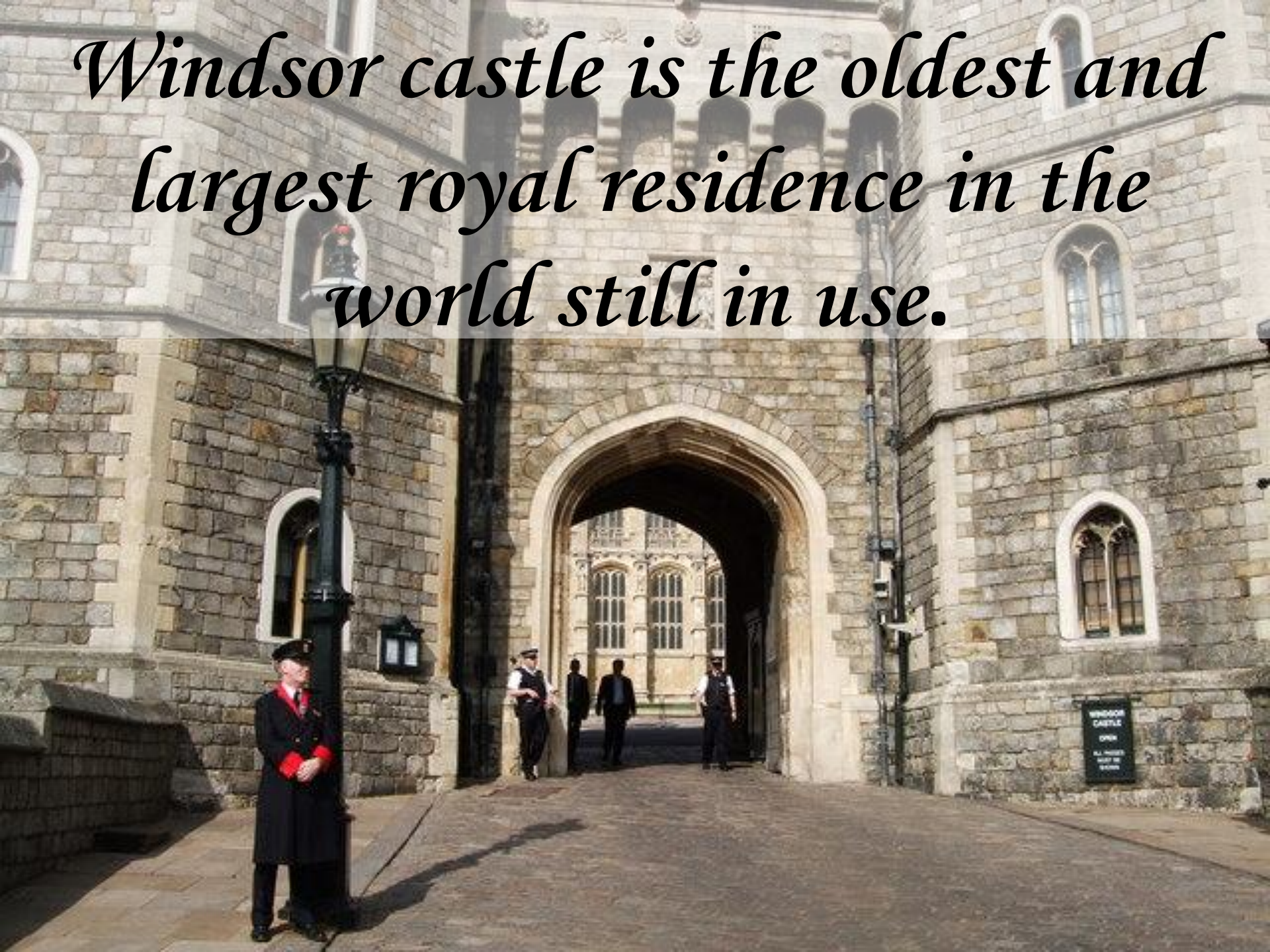
# House of Lords
