



Present tenses

- There are four present tenses in English:
- o Present simple
- o Present continuous
- o Present perfect
- o Present perfect continuous





Present simple: form

Positive:

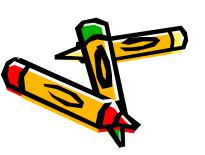
I/You/ We/They <u>live</u> She/He/It lives

Negative:

I/You/ We/They <u>don't live</u> She/He/It <u>doesn't live</u>

Interrogative:

<u>Do</u> you/I/we/they <u>live</u>? Yes, I <u>do</u>. / No, they <u>don't</u>. <u>Does</u> she/he/it <u>live</u>? Yes, she <u>does</u>. / No, it <u>doesn't</u>.





Present simple: uses

1. Habits:

I go for a walk every afternoon.

2. Things that are always true:

Water boils when you heat it.

3. Things that are true for a long time:

My father works as a shop assistant.

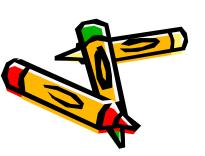
3.1 Timetable

The bus leaves at 7 p.m

Present continuous: form

Positive:

I <u>am working</u>
You/ We/They <u>are working</u>
She/He/It <u>is working</u>



Present continuous: form

Negative:

l'<u>m not working</u> You/ We/They <u>aren't working</u> She/He/It <u>isn't working</u>



Present continuous: form

Interrogative:

```
Am I working?
Yes, I am. / No, I'm not.
Are you/we/they working?
Yes, we are. / No, they aren't.
Is she/he/it working?
Yes, she is. / No, he isn't.
```



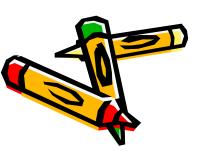
Present continuous: uses

1. Activities happening (around) now:

I'm writing my doctoral thesis.

2. Future personal plans:

We're getting married in October.

PRESENT CONTINUOUS

- at the moment в данный момент
- at this moment в этот момент
- today/tonight сегодня
- · now сейчас
- · right now прямо сейчас
- Listen! слушай!
- · Look! смотри!





Present perfect: form

Positive:

I/You/ We/They <u>have lived</u> She/He/It <u>has lived</u>





Present perfect: form

Negative:

I/You/ We/They <u>haven't lived</u>
She/He/It <u>hasn't lived</u>





Present perfect: form

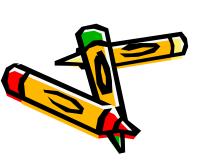
Interrogative:

Have you/I/we/they lived?

Yes, I have. / No, you haven't.

Has she/he/it lived?

Yes, she <u>has</u>. / No, it <u>hasn't</u>.






Present perfect criteria

Result - now

Time - not important

Action-finished

e.g. I have left my telephone at home.



Present perfect: uses


1. Recently completed action - news:


We have just watched a film.

Have you found a new job?

Signal words:

- \square Just только что,
- □ Already- уже,
- *□ Yet* ещё, уже,
- □ Lately недавно.





2. Action started and still happening: Signal words and examples:


signat words and example

- ☐ Since с какого-то момента
 - e.g. I haven't eaten anything since breakfast.
- ☐ For в течении какого-то периода времени
 - e.g. He has lived in Novosibirsk for 20 years.



3. Personal past experience: Signal words and examples:


- ☐ Never- никогда
 - e.g. I have never been to London.
- □ Ever- когда-либо
 - e.g. Have you ever been to London?





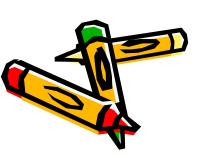
Present perfect continuous: form Positive:

I/You/ We/They <u>have been living</u>
She/He/It <u>has been living</u>



Present perfect continuous: form Negative:

I/You/ We/They <u>haven't been living</u>
She/He/It <u>hasn't been living</u>



Present perfect continuous: form


Interrogative:

Have you/I/we/they been living?

Yes, I <u>have</u>. / No, you <u>haven't</u>.

Has she/he/it been living?

Yes, she <u>has</u>. / No, he <u>hasn't</u>.




Present perfect continuous: uses

1. Action started in the past and is still happening:

I've been learning English for 10 years. She has been driving since high school.

2. Action started in the past and has just stopped:

You look tired. Have you been working <u>all day</u>?



Difference

Present Perfect

RESULT

e.g. Have you ever played football?

Present Perfect
Continuous

DURATION

e.g. I've been playing football since morning.
