

Phrasal verbs

(Get)



Meanings of phrasal verbs with "Get" ...

- **GET AT** □ *to access or reach*
- **GET INTO** □ *to be involved with*
- **GET OFF** □ *to receive extreme pleasure*
- **Get on something** □ *step onto a vehicle*
- **Get over** □ *to overcome, recover from*
- **Get around** □ *to evade*



□ **Get through** □ **to finish something completely; to arrive at the end of something**

Get stg across □ **communicate, make understandable**

Get along/on □ **like each other**

Get back □ **return stg back**



- **Get together** □ **meet** (usually for social reasons)
- **Get up** □ **get out of bed**
- **Get up** □ **stand**
- **GET to** □ **to annoy**
- **GET into** □ **arrive**



One phrasal verb with many meanings...

- **GET OUT** □ to become known

*The news about Mary **got out** very quickly.*

- **GET OUT** □ to escape or leave

*Sam wouldn't stop talking so we asked him to **get out**.*

- **GET OUT** □ cause to escape or leave

*Please **get that cat out** of here.*



Get away □ *go on vacation*

Why are you packing? I'll *get away* for some time .

Get away with stg □ *do without being noticed or punished*

GET AWAY □ *to escape*

He manage to *get away* from the police.
