- Get around ☐ to evade

■ Get throught □ to finish something completely; to arrive at the end of something

Get stg across \square communicate, make understable

Get along/on □ **like each other**

Get back □ return stg back

- Get together □ meet (usually for social reasons)
- □ Get up □ get out of bed
- □ Get up □ stand
- □ GET to □ to annoy
- GET into □ arrive
