EACH. What it means?

We use **each** when we think of things separately, one by one.



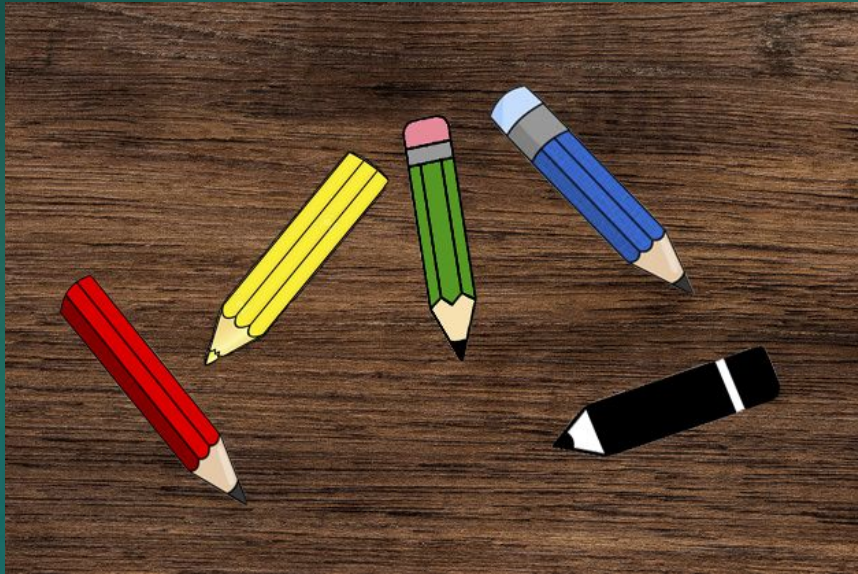
Each of them wears sunglasses and a black suit.

If you still don't understand, I'll show how it works. Let's imagine these X's is a person or thing.

$$\text{each} = X + X + X + X$$

Got it?

Each is more usual for a small number



There's a five pencils on the table. Each pencil has a different color.



At the beginning of the game(Durak), each player has a six cards.

EVERY

We use every when we think of things as a group.
The meaning is similar to all.



Every car has a steering wheel. (all cars in general)

Again...

every =



Easy, huh?

It more usual for a large number



Kate loves reading. She has read every book in the library.



Derek is a traveler. He visited every state of America.

Similarity between “each” and “every”

Sometimes, each and every are similar in meaning.
Often it's possible to use each or every



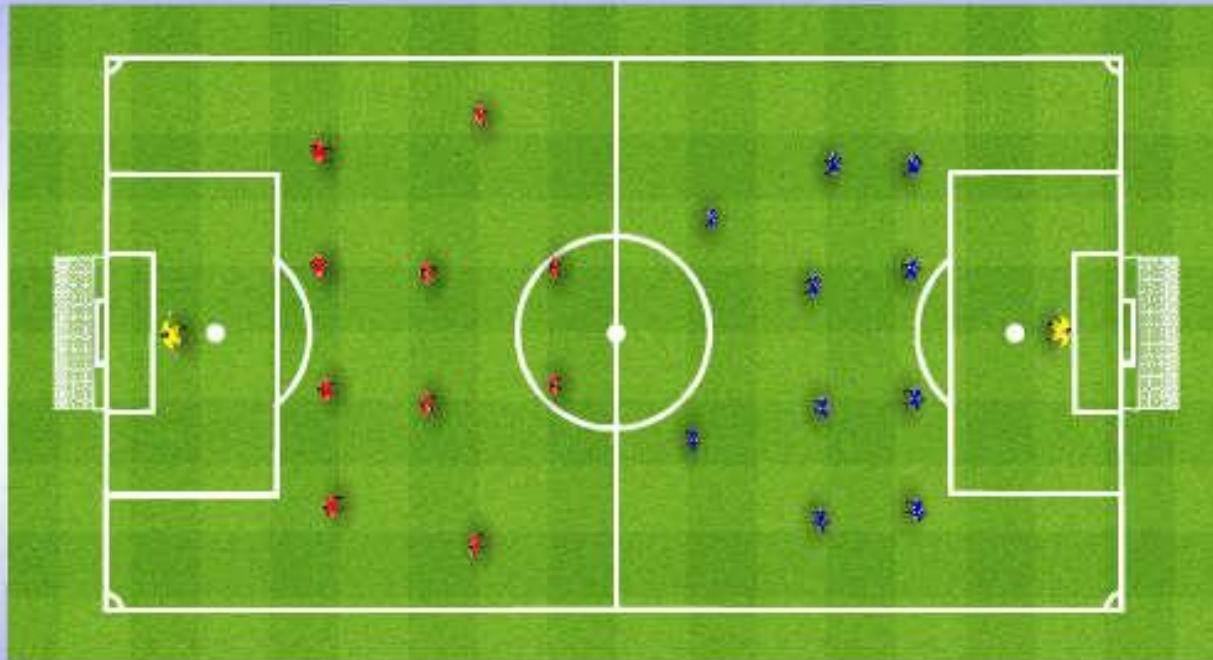
Examples:

Each/Every time I see you, you look different

There's a telephone in every/each room of the house

Features of “Each”

Each (but not every) can be used for two things

Each football team has a eleven players.

Features of “Every”

We use every (not each) to say how often something happens.



How often do you eat a fast food?
EVERY DAY!



There's a bus every ten
minutes

What did we learn?

- **Sometimes, Each and Every are similar in meaning**
- **“Each” occurs when we think of things separately**
- **“Every” is similar to all, everything**
